The entry requirements for this course is a Pass grade on Swedish for International Students and Researchers, course 2, or equivalent prior knowledge shown in a Placement test.

Course content

The course is aimed at international students and researchers at Stockholm University who need to be able to communicate in Swedish. The course provides knowledge about the structures of spoken and written Swedish. Pronunciation and listening comprehension is also practiced. The course material is made up of texts and conversations about familiar topics such as personal interests, occupation and work, current news and well-known social phenomena, as well as descriptions of basic language rules. During the course the student will practice applying the basic rules of the grammar, pronunciation and spelling of the standard language.

Learning outcomes

In order to pass the course, students are expected to be able to:

- re-tell and comment on information that has been read or heard and which contains everyday and frequent vocabulary, as well as be able to exchange knowledge concerning well-known topics and occupations in presentations and conversations
- write simple texts about well-known subjects and personal interests, and describe experiences and impressions

Education

Instruction is given in the form of seminars with exercises in practical Swedish. Students produce oral presentations and written assignments. One oral presentation as well as written assignments are mandatory

elements of the course.

Forms of examination

- a. The course is examined on the basis of a written examination. For more detailed information, please refer to the course description.
- b. Grades will be set according to a two-point scale:
U= Fail
G= Pass
- c. Students will be informed of the written grading criteria when the course starts.
- d. In order to pass the course, students must receive a Pass grade on the oral presentation and the written examination as well as completed mandatory assignments within the timespan of the course. Under special circumstances, the examiner may, after consulting with coordinating teacher, grant the student an exemption from the obligation to participate in certain mandatory course elements. The student can then be assigned a compensatory assignment.
- e. Students who receive the Pass grade may not retake the examination to attain a higher grade. Students who receive the Fail grade twice by the same examiner are entitled to have another examiner appointed for the next examination, unless there are special reasons to the contrary. Such requests should be made to the department board.
- f. This course does not include any opportunities to complete a supplementary assignment in order to convert a Fail grade into a Pass grade.

Interim

When the syllabus is discontinued or significantly altered, students have the right to be examined according to this syllabus once per semester during a transition period of three semesters. However, restrictions noted under e. above apply. Such requests should be made to the department board.

Limitations

This course may not be included in a degree at Stockholm University, either as a main field of study or as additional studies.
