Education

Instruction is in the form of lectures and seminars.

Forms of examination

Examination is by an individually written take-home examination, and the written and oral critical review of a scientific article.

To pass the course students must have obtained at least grade E on the home-examination and actively participated in any other mandatory parts of the course.
