Course content

The course consolidates and extends knowledge of Korean grammar and improves reading skills and the ability to write texts in Korean on both social and more abstract subject areas.

Learning outcomes

In order to pass the course, students are expected to be able to:

(Reading Practice 3)

- analyze and translate easier factual texts from Korean into Swedish
- interpret and rewrite idiomatic expressions and proverbs
- discuss and motivate the choice of method in the translations

(Reading Practice 4)

- analyze and translate moderately difficult Korean factual prose texts into Swedish
- analyze and translate Korean prose texts into Swedish
- discuss and motivate the choice of method in the translation

(Writing Practice)

- discuss and write simple expository texts and written assignements in Korean

Education

Instruction is given in the form of seminars and group excercises. All teaching sessions is mandatory. For more detailed information, please refer to the course description.

Forms of examination

- a. Reading Practice 3 & 4 is examined on the basis of a written examination at the end of teh course. Writing Practice is examined on the basis of a written examination. For more detailed information, please refer to the course description.
- b. Grades will be set according to a seven-point scale related to the learning objectives of the course, A = Excellent, B = Very good, C = Good, D = Satisfactory, E = Adequate, Fx = Inadequate, F = Totally inadequate.
- c. Students will be informed of the written grading criteria when the course starts. Grading criteria are binding.
- d. In order to pass the course, students must receive a grade of E or higher on all examinations, complete all mandatory assignements and meet the attendance requirements of 80%. Under special circumstances, the examiner may, after consulting with the coordinating teacher, grant the student an exemption from the attendance requirements. The student can then be assigned a compensatory assignement. The letter grades A-E are converted into numbers 5-1 and aggregated to an average grade, which is calculated by weighting the number of higher education credits of each course unit. The final course grade thus constitutes a weighted average of the course units. Standard rules for rounding numbers apply.
- e. At least two examination opportunities should be offered for each course. At least one examination opportunity should be offered during a semester when teh course is not given. Students who receive the grade E or higher may not retake the examination to attain a higher degree. Students who receive the frade Fx or F twice by the same examiner are entitled to have another examiner apponited for teh next examination, unless there are special reasons to the contrary. Such requests should be made to the department board.
- f. This course does not include any opportunities to complete a supplementary assignement in order to convert the grade Fx into a passing grade.

Interim

When the syllabus is discontinued, students have teh right to be examined according to this syllabus once per semester during a transition period of three semesters.

Limitations

This course may not be included in a degree together with a course, taken in Sweden or elsewhere, of identical or partially similar content.
