Course content

The course is intended for foreign students enrolled in an exchange programme at the Department of Law or in the Stockholm Business School Summer programme at Stockholm University. The course provides an overview of EU law in national, international and comparative legal contexts. The course covers EU legal areas such as constitutional law, EU institutions, as well as the EU laws and principles governing the EU's internal market on the basis of the Treaty rules on the free movement of goods, persons, workers, services and establishments. Particular emphasis is placed on the increasingly prominent social dimension of the internal market. EU harmonization legislation in the matter and other "softer" forms of cooperation, such as social dialogue, are also addressed. The language of instruction is English.

Learning outcomes

Knowledge and understanding

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- Independently apply basic EU principles; - Identify relevant legal issues and facts in different contexts.

Skills and abilities

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

- Compare solutions on certain legal issues existing in the legal system of the students' home countries as well as in the EU, and to independently investigate the reasons behind the differences.

Judgement and Approach

After completing the course, the student is expected to:

- Critically assess, evaluate and present different solutions for various types of legal matters in English, both orally and in writing, independently and in groups.

Education

Instruction comprises 2 weeks of full-time studies and consists of lectures and seminars. On the basis of the given course material, students will work in groups to answer questions during each seminar. Participation in 2/3 of seminars and lectures is compulsory. A more detailed description of the course content is available in the course description and course schedule.

Forms of examination

Examination is conducted through:

- Active participation in the compulsory elements of the course,
- A written examination.

The language of examination is English. All of the course's learning outcomes must be met and all activities passed in order to pass the course. The course materials students are allowed to take with during examinations are set out in the teaching syllabus.

Students who fail the regular examination are given the opportunity for re-examination. Students who have passed are not entitled to undergo re-examination for higher grades. Students who are failed twice by the same examiner have the right to demand a different examiner when doing additional re-examinations. This does not however apply if there are specific reasons for not appointing a different examiner.

The grading scale for the course is as follows: Pass (G) or Fail (U).

Completed compulsory assignments are valid for two years. This also applies in cases where a student deregisters from the course by withdrawing.

A student has the right - for a period of two years after registration - to invoke the course requirements contained in the course syllabus applicable at the time the student first registered for the course.
