Course content

From a postcolonial perspective, the course gives a presentation of concepts and issues around representation, "race" and the heritage and use of colonial stereotypes within today's media culture. Within moving picture media, whiteness tends to be surprisingly invisible and represent a generic human, because non-whites represent something different or exotic. The course goes beyond the binary the division and division between the western world and developing countries and also presents different perspectives such as Third Cinema, Fourth Cinema and World Cinema. Through various examples and case studies, the course examines how national and ethnic hierarchies are produced and potentially disturbed. In addition to postcolonial theory, also overlapping research fields, such as critical studies of whiteness, gender and intersectionality as well as research on transnational issues and diaspora are presented, all of which question a hegemonic knowledge view and way of seeing.

Learning outcomes

To pass the course, the student must:

- display comprehensive knowledge of the specific concepts and issues that occur within it postcolonial research field;
- use analytical tools to discuss contemporary challenges in postcolonial media studies
- show ability to contextualize a wide field of postcolonial history and research and apply these to moving picture media.

Education

The teaching consists of lectures, seminars, group exercises and screenings of film and other media material.

Forms of examination

- a. The course is examined through two written assignments and an oral presentation. Examination takes place in English. For more detailed information, please refer to the course description. The course description is available no later than one month before the course starts.
- b. Grading takes place according to a seven-point goal-related grading scale: A = Excellent B = Very good C = Good D = Satisfactory E = Sufficient Fx = Insufficient F = Completely insufficient
- c. Announced goal-related grading criteria are binding.
- d. To obtain a final grade for the course, a minimum grade of E is required for all examination assignments.
- e. For each course, at least two examinations are offered. The academic year that the course is missing is offered at least one examination opportunity. Students who have received the grade Fx or F on a test twice in a row by one and the same examiner are entitled to have another examiner appointed at the next examination, unless special reasons speak against it. The request for this must be made to the department board. Students who have received the lowest grade E must not undergo a renewed examination for higher grades.
- f. Supplement can be granted if the student is close to the limit for approved. The task must be submitted within two weeks. In the case of approved completion of simpler formal errors, the grades A-E are used. In the case of approved completion of deficiencies of understanding character - less misunderstanding, minor inaccuracies or in some part too limited reasoning - the grade A-E is used.

Interim

When the syllabus is canceled, the student has the right to be examined once per semester according to the current syllabus during a settlement period of three semesters.

Limitations

The course may not be credited in a degree at the same time as such a course, which has been completed or approved in a country or abroad, whose content is wholly or partly in accordance with the course.
